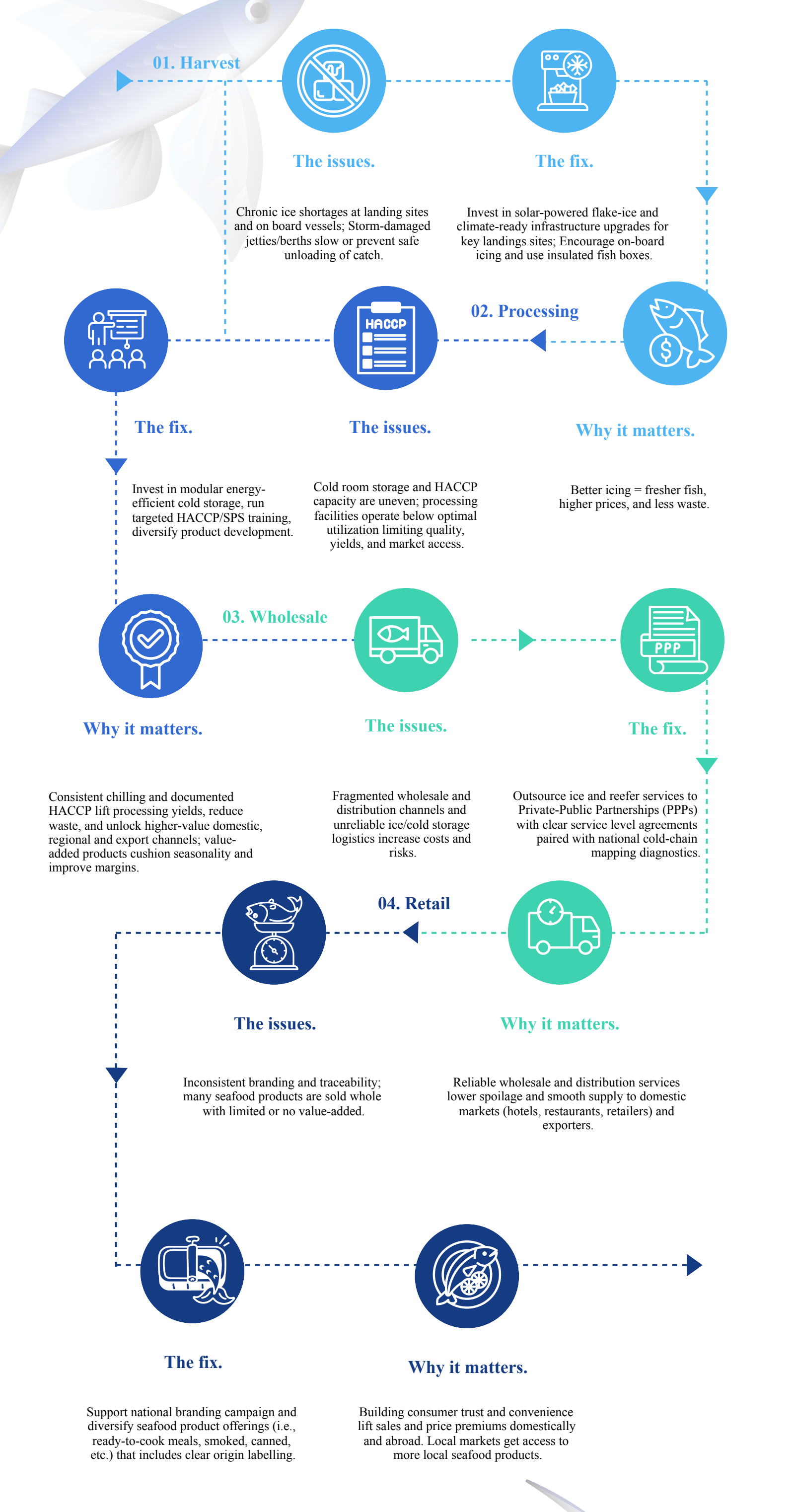


From Boat to Plate. Strengthening Barbados' Fisheries Value Chain

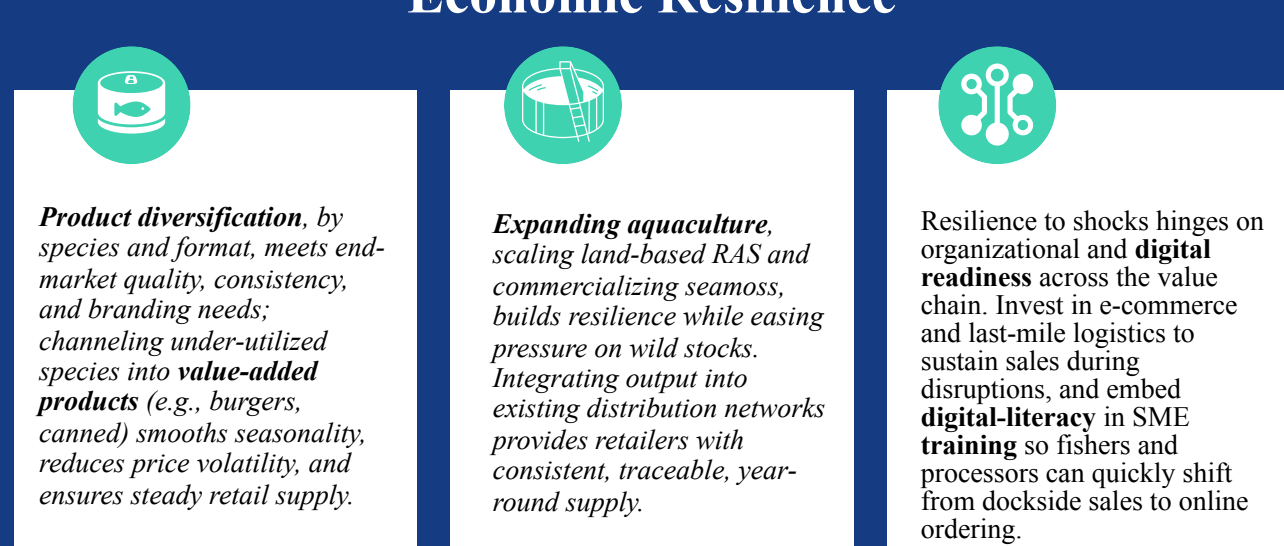

Why Resilience Matters

Hurricane Beryl severely damaged jetties, landing sites, and vessels, severely disrupting Barbados' fisheries value chain. Climate-proofed cold chain and landing sites are urgently needed to protect quality, supply, and livelihoods.

Inclusion and Finance

Expand micro-finance, incubators, and risk-mitigation tools for small-and-medium sized enterprises, especially women and youth. Use Public-Private Partnerships and blue bonds to fund upgrades and unlock innovation across the chain.

Training and Skills Development

Targeted training and skills development opportunities, such as industry-partnered scholarships, apprenticeships, and vocational training, that are integrated across the value chain to build a diverse talent pipeline and reduce entry barriers.
